## *From the Archbishop*


The challenge of present day ministry and mission in Canada's North continues to confront us in the Diocese of Yukon as it does similarly in other northern dioceses of the Anglican Church of Canada. Recently at a Council of the North meeting in Edmonton Alberta we as a Council identified particular areas of common need and concern in our various dioceses. There was a strongly identified need for training and equipping our people for ministry.

In the Diocese of Yukon it is very obvious that if we do not train and equip our people for ministry we will not be able to continue effectively at all as a diocese engaged in the mission of the Church.

We continue to encourage, equip and enable those of our people who are willing to commit to a learning process, in order that we might use to the fullest extent possible the ministry resources that our Lord has given us in our people, for the glory of God and the strengthening of His Church.

Recent changes in the Diocese of Yukon have encouraged us to take a serious look at the mission purpose of the Church. These changes, for the purpose of mission and ministry, have also called for a greater commitment from all of us to work together in prayerful and creative ways to make good things happen in our congregations and in the communities in which we live.

One of the dangers we face as a diocese, in what we call Circle Ministry, is that of being inward looking. The call of mission asks us to look and reach out from ourselves to the world around us. The first mark of mission is the



proclamation of the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ in word and deed, helping people to come to know Christ and to make Him known. We are called to be a disciple-making Church not a self-serving Church.

Prayer plays a central role in mission. Our Lord prayerfully discerned God's direction in His mission purpose and so must we as His Church. Please pray with us that we will continue to prayerfully discern God's direction for us as a diocese.

It is so vitally important that we work together with our Lord, carrying out ministry and engaging in mission in the enabling strength and guidance of the Holy Spirit.

As this issue of Northern Lights comes to you in the Season of Easter may it bring to you a continued awareness of the Diocese of Yukon and its people but especially may it bring to you a renewed awareness of that wonderful Good News message:

Christ has died,

Christ is risen,

Christ will come again.

## Photo Exhibit Opens in Whitehorse

The Old Log Church Museum/Yukon Church Heritage Society would like to thank everyone who attended the opening reception for the photo exhibit *"Connections to the Past, Legacy for the Future: 150 Years of the Anglican Church in the North."* It was held in the Hougen Heritage Gallery at Arts Underground in Whitehorse, Friday, November 7<sup>th</sup>, 2008. We were happy to have several people speak at our event. Arlene

Kubica, from the Board of Directors of the Yukon Church Heritage Society acted as our emcee for the evening. Minister Elaine Taylor spoke on behalf of YTG Tourism and Culture and Sarah Usher spoke on behalf of the Diocese of Yukon. There was delicious food on hand as the event was catered by Tracey from "Umbellula on the River".

Through the use of archival material, memoirs, historic photos, films and

interviews, we created this photo exhibit to tell the story of the Anglican Church's long history in the Yukon, from its first missionary arriving

in 1861 to the present day. We also produced a 60 minute audio-visual

presentation which goes into greater detail about the history of the Anglican Church which is intricately linked to the history and development of the Yukon Territory. The Anglican Church has played a key role in the Yukon's history from the fur trade era onwards. Early explorers, traders, and miners were soon followed by missionaries anxious to spread

the Christian message. Church workers were present and involved in key periods in the Yukon's history including the Klondike Gold Rush and its aftermath, post-contact First Nations history, both world wars, and events

as contemporary as dealing with the issues of the residential school era. Many individuals associated with the Yukon Anglican Church were also key figures in Yukon history – people such as Bishop Bompas, Bishop Isaac Stringer, Reverend Richard Martin and Deaconess Hilda Hellaby.

The Old Log Church Museum /Yukon Church Heritage Society gratefully acknowledges the financial support



for the creation of this exhibit from the Community Development Fund, Economic Development and Museums Unit, Tourism and Culture, Government of Yukon. Again, within the Church it is no different. And when that leader has been raised up from within the organization, from the entry position right up through the ranks, it is extra special indeed. Well, within the Church that is how it is always done. Those we know as leaders within the Church were at one time simply a part of a loving Church community of believers being nurtured in their faith by those around them. Until one day, at some unknown time, they felt a call and became ready to assume a leadership role. That person's leadership role, no matter where it is realized, is at

Whitehorse Anglicans have launched an exciting new model of ministry, starting in January, 2009. By the grace of God, under Archbishop Terry Buckle's guidance and with much prayer, it was unanimously decided at special congregational meetings of Christ Church Cathedral and The Church of the Northern Apostles at the end of 2008, that a new model of ministry be adopted, called The Anglican Parish of Whitehorse (APW).

In this model, both congregations form one Parish. The financial arrangement in the Parish is that there will be a two thirds/one third sharing of ministry costs between the congregations. The Cathedral will pay two thirds of the Rector's salary and housing and Northern Apostles one third. There will continue to be separate Vestries (or Church Councils) and each congregation will handle its own finances, run many of its own programs and develop its own identity within the larger setting of the Parish. Regular Sunday Services will continue in both congregations.

Archbishop Buckle has appointed Archdeacon Sean Murphy as Interim Rector of the new Parish. Archdeacon Sean will be based at the Cathedral and have office hours Tuesday to Friday, 9:00 am to 11:45 am.


An APW Executive Council, consisting of clergy, wardens and treasurers of the two congregations will meet every two months or as necessary. The purpose of the Executive Council is to review and



evaluate ministry developments in the Parish and monitor how we are doing in the new model.

The APW is a missionary Parish with responsibility for support and outreach to the surrounding communities of Carcross, Tagish, Teslin, and Haines Junction. A Parish

Ministry Team has been formed, consisting of Archbishop Buckle, who leads the Team, Archdeacon Murphy, The Rev. David Pritchard, the Rev. Deacon Sarah Usher, Lay Minister Ellen Zimmerman and Parish Secretary, Rob Christie. We meet weekly (except



for Ellen, who has work commitments) for prayer, planning, encouragement, mutual support and teaching from the Archbishop. One of the first things that the Team did was to start Monday to Friday mid-day (11:45 am) prayer, open to all who wish to join us.

The vision of the new model is to make faithful use of the financial resources and Spiritual gifts in the two congregations to enable more effective Gospel ministry and mission in Whitehorse and beyond. The model is an interim initiative and will be reviewed at the end of June, 2009.

A recent highlight was a joint Cathedral – Northern Apostles Service on February 8th at the Cathedral. About seventy-five people gathered for a joyous time of worship, to celebrate and commission ministries in the Parish, and mark the start of Archdeacon Sean's ministry as Rector. Three people within our midst also reaffirmed their baptismal vows during the Service. At a certain point in the Service we linked together in a circle around the Cathedral nave, and the Archbishop directed us to turn around and turn the circle outwards to the world. We were reminded not just of the potential and many gifts in the Parish, but of our purpose to reach out into our community with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

At a recent Ministry Team Meeting, four priorities were identified for the APW: (1) Prayer – personal, as a Team, corporately as a Church, especially

# An Amazing Thank You to an Amazing Church

Across Canada in churches, prisons, college chapels, youth gatherings and wherever Anglicans met over the last six months, “Amazing Grace” was sung. It was sung with enthusiasm, with love and with support for the Council of the North. It was sung in a variety of languages and to a variety of instruments.

Even before the actual Sunday of singing, November 23rd, 2008, groups of Anglicans were gathering to sing the hymn. They sang to show their unity. They sang to show their love for God. They have seen the videos of Canadian Anglicans singing “Amazing Grace”. They have heard about the offering of the “toonies”. They have gathered and sung the hymn “Amazing Grace” and made their donations.


Marion Jenkins, one of the coordinators of the Henry Budd College of Ministry reported this: “Christ Church, The Pas,

Manitoba in the Diocese of Brandon, a Council of the North diocese was amazing singing “Amazing Grace” that morning. We sang the first verse in English, then in Cree, then all the other verses. The congregation made its way to the chancel and sang the first verse again in English. Not everyone was there yet, so we kept singing in Cree and English. People were generous.

It was great fun and Holy chaos.”

As members of the Council take in what happened on this special Sunday for the Church, they would like to say “thank you, ekosi (muskeg Cree), megwetch (Ojibwa), naqurmik (Inuktitut) kitatamihin (Plains Cree), mahsi (Gwich'in) gunalcheesh (tlingit) as they look forward to the new ministry projects they will be able to take on.

## A Nugget of Yukon History

Well known Christ Church Cathedral parishioner Gudrun (Erickson) Sparling has a unique history. Her pioneer father, John Olaf Erickson, came from Sweden during the Goldrush via South Africa and the Boer War. He mined in the Dawson and Kluane areas.

In '1925 he married his wife Kristina in Sweden and returned to Whitehorse, then a mere transportation link to the Goldfields with a population of 350: the total population of Yukon at that time was 5,500 people.

They purchased the original Regina Hotel and attended the Old Log Church. Gudrun had to be baptized in the Presbyterian Church because there was no minister at the Anglican Church at that time. "Goodie" as she is called, clearly remembers early Church history, and over the years participated in the Church from Sunday School to a long term member of the Vestry.

"Goodie" attended the old Lambert Street School and the Principal was Jack Hulland. When she later became a teacher, Jack Hulland was the Superintendent of Education!

When the town suddenly changed in 1942 with the Alaska Highway and Canol Projects and sprang to a population of 20,000 the hotel was suddenly caught up in World War II. The old Log Church and Rectory became a popular destination for lonely soldiers, welcomed by the Rev. Chappell and his wife.



Some of this exciting time has been captured in a fifty page book entitled "*The Canol Adventures*" by Pat Ellis, featuring Goodie's story and pictures as well as contributions from Alex Van Bibber, Gert Gillis and Goodie's husband, Joe.


